COURSE OVERVIEW Welcome:

This online course prepares students to promote health by examining the influence of policy at local, state, national and global levels. Students will analyze healthcare policies in the context of emerging models of care and ethical social, political, and legal environments. This is a completely online course; however, there is a Practicum Experience where students are required to attend 1 policy meeting or interview a policymaker. Course faculty must approve the experience. **This course will run over 10 weeks.**

University Course Catalog Description: This course prepares students to promote health by examining the influence of policy at local, state, national, and global levels. Students will analyze healthcare policies in the context of emerging models of care, and ethical, social, political, and legal environments.

Course Overview: This course focuses on the health care system, policy formation and analysis, economics, finance, outcomes, and the role of leadership. Analysis of health care policies provides context for examining

partnerships, mode of care, emerging ethical, social, political, cultural, and legal issues affecting health promotion and disease prevention.

Tools of Engagement: Mental Health, Communication, and Longevity in Nursing Integrated Behavioral Healthcare for Nurses

This module focuses on how to create a collaborative, integrated, whole-person and equitable approach to physical and behavioral health. Material in this module focuses on coordination of care across the various health care systems and resources that may be involved in treating an individual patient, including awareness of behavioral health care resources and continuity between the medical and behavioral health care systems, and strategies for overcoming barriers to patient participation in mental health and substance use treatment. This module's content is complementary to the Mental Health Responder module's content on mind-body interactions and is also complementary to the interprofessional MI communication techniques presented in the Therapeutic Communication module. The modules are designed to be taken in any order.

Objectives:

1. Understand the connection between mental and physical health.
2. Identify barriers to accessing quality mental health and substance use treatment.
3. Define integrated behavioral healthcare.
4. Identify the impact of integrated behavioral healthcare on patient outcomes.
5. Recognize strategies to provide integrated behavioral healthcare approaches in nursing across the continuum of care.

Module requirements:

1. Online module – self enroll in the Canvas course.
2. Oxford Medical Simulation (OMS) – complete the virtual simulation.
3. Discussion board posting in the Tools of Engagement module.

Instructions for Canvas course self-enrollment and the virtual simulation account access information, will be sent to students via email. After completion of the module, the virtual simulation and the discussion board posting you will receive a certificate of completion. Course faculty will be receiving confirmation of your progress and completion for this assignment. **Completion of all three components is a requirement for successful completion of this course.**

Using Artificial Intelligence:

Utilizing ChatGPT or other generative language models is not necessarily a form of plagiarism; it depends on how these are used. In line with JAMA’s new policy on generative AI models

(<https://jamanetwork.com/journals/jama/fullarticle/2807956>), you must:

1. Disclose any way in which these models or tools were used to create content or assist with writing or paper preparation, including the name of the tool, version number, and a description of how the tool was used (e.g., for initial idea generation, as part of an Internet reference search, as a style editor), and also,
2. Take responsibility for the integrity of the content generated by these tools, including the accuracy of any references cited.

You can meet this disclosure requirement by adding an addendum to your paper about the use of the technology; the statement about using AI tools does not count toward the page limit within the paper itself. Note, this guidance

includes the use of all writing assistive tools (e.g., Grammarly) which include generative AI components. If you are in doubt whether your use of a writing tool is allowable, err on the side of full disclosure.

Failure to disclose your use of AI could be considered plagiarism and result in disciplinary consequences.

Policies

Course Procedures

I. Course Policies: Grades

- a. **Rounding of Final Course Grades** Final Course letter grades are calculated and submitted to the registrar based on whole numbers. A minimum standard of rounding in all courses is necessary to provide consistency and transparency to students. Only the final course grade that represents the completion of all coursework will be used for rounding purposes. The calculated final course grade will be rounded using the number in the tenth position after the decimal of the final grade calculations. Final course grades of 0.5 and higher will be rounded up to the next whole number. When the number at the tenth decimal place is less than 0.5 the grade is rounded down to the next whole number. For example, a final course grade of 87.52% will be rounded up to 88%. A final course grade of 87.49% will result in a final grade of 87%.
- b. **Attendance Policy:**
 - i. Class attendance and participation is a professional expectation.
 - a. Take responsibility for keeping up with the readings and assignments for each scheduled class or content area.
 - b. Class participation and completion of all learning activities is required for successful completion of this course.
 - c. Participate in discussions (in class or online) to define, interpret, summarize, give examples, make conclusions, etc. about the concepts discussed and about what your classmates have discussed.

c. **Late Work Policy:**

Due dates for assignments are clearly posted on the syllabus. It is your responsibility to submit these assignments on time and according to their defined critical elements. Late assignments turned in 24 hours after a posted deadline will not be graded and the student will receive a zero for that assignment unless previous arrangements have been made with the instructor. Any assignments turned in late and before 24 hours will incur a 10% grade reduction.

d. **Late work** is defined as: Any assignment submitted after the posted due date.

e. **The consequence for late assignments is:**

The student will receive a 10% reduction for any assignment submitted after the due date AND before 24 hours late. The student will receive a 0 for any assignment turned in 24 or more hours after the due date unless previous arrangements have been made with the instructor.

- f. **Extra Credit Policy:** There is no extra credit in this course.
- g. **Make-up Exam Policy:** There are no exams.
- h. **Grades of Incomplete Policy:**

The current university policy concerning incomplete grades will be followed in this course. Incomplete grades are given only in situations where unexpected emergencies prevent a student from completing the course and the remaining work can be completed the next semester. Your instructor is the final authority on whether you qualify for an incomplete. Incomplete work must be finished by the end of the subsequent semester or the “I” will automatically be recorded as an “F” on your transcript.

- i. **Rewrite/Resubmit Policy:** The opportunity for rewrite or resubmit will be negotiated with the instructor of the course on an individual student basis.
- j. **Group Work:** Be respectful to each other. Kind words, attend meetings as scheduled, and meet timelines. Establish norms for your group in week one.

e. The CU College of Nursing Student Honor and Conduct Code policy requires that course professors and fellow students who suspect plagiarism or other violations of the honor code must immediately report the incident to the Student Honor and Conduct Committee. This committee evaluates the situation and determines the appropriate consequences. Potential consequences include termination of the student's enrollment in the College of Nursing. Plagiarism is the use of another person's ideas or words without acknowledgement. The incorporation of another person's work into yours requires appropriate identification and acknowledgement. Examples of plagiarism when the source is not noted include: word- for-word copying of another person's ideas or words; the "mosaic" (interspersing your own words here and there while, in essence, copying another's work); the paraphrase (the rewriting of another's work, while still using their basic ideas or theories); fabrication (inventing or counterfeiting sources); submission of another's work as your own; and neglecting quotation marks when including direct quotes, even on material that is otherwise acknowledge.

Cheating involves the possession, communication or use of information, materials, notes, study aids, or other devices and rubrics not specifically authorized by the course instructor in any academic exercise, or unauthorized communication with any other person during an academic exercise. Examples of cheating include: copying from another's work or receiving unauthorized assistance from another; using a calculator, computer, or the internet when its use has been precluded; collaborating with another or others without the consent of the instructor; submitting another's work as one's own.

Fabrication involves inventing or counterfeiting information - creating results not properly obtained through study or laboratory experiment. Falsification involves deliberate alteration or changing of results to suit one's needs in an experiment or academic exercise.

Multiple submissions involves submitting academic work in a current course when academic credit for the work was previously earned in another course, when such submission is made without the current course instructor's authorization.

Misuse of academic materials
